The Soul-Winning Business by Chaplain Michael A Hernandez



What does it mean to be in the business of winning souls for Christ?

Accepted or otherwise, the once acknowledged “moral high ground” has become so delineated and subjective that any inference to what is good or even what is considered evil is quickly scrutinized by those who strive to eradicate any semblance of universal interpretation or morality, lest anyone be offended.

As Disciples of Christ, how do we maintain an example of biblical standards within a society that not only is quick to take offense to the Word of God, but equally quick to attack basic biblical tenets? Ranging terms have become social-household terminology in describing Christianity and Biblical references to mainstream issues.

Still, the Bible teaches that the harvest is ripe but the workers are few. I can say with most assuredness that the harvest is indeed ripe within the walls of the Mesa County Detention Facility. Subsequently, I am amazed at the humility and love for God many jail inmates express as it pertains to the message of the cross. Upon accepting Jesus Christ as their Lord and

Savior, inmates oftentimes will tell me that they can't wait to share God's truth with friends and loved ones but feel unable to witness because they are incarcerated. I smile at them, spread my arms and tell them, "behold the harvest!" And so it begins. God redeems it all, for such a time as this!

God has remained faithful in that precautionary Covid-19 volunteer restrictions, now allow a handful of religious volunteers to resume Bible studies and church services throughout the jail.

"It's nice to see that inmates recognize the need and the importance of Bible studies," says April Urban, a regular Bible study facilitator with the Mesa County Jail Ministry. "The truth and hope the Word of God provides is a timeless message for everyone. For many inmates, the Word of God is received during the most lonely and spiritually convicting times of their lives within the absence of mind-altering chemicals



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or unhealthy coping skills to rely upon. Subsequently, God makes sense for the first time in their lives prompting inmates to recognize that incarceration was a small price to pay to realize what is truly important." Oftentimes I myself will go and just sit within various pods throughout the jail asking the Lord to open hearts and bring people. Sure enough, God is always faithful! Some of the most

heartwarming and inspirational interactions have been unplanned, Holy-Spirit divine appointments which only greater affirms the opportunity we have to share the Gospel within this age of grace.

Even more encouraging to me is that I know the Word of God never returns void! And though I

may not always see its fruits, I know God’s plan and Biblical principles have taken root in the lives of those imprisoned.

Truly, being a soul winner for Jesus Christ is not only a calling to us all as instructed within the great commission, but it is more so an opportunity to share the Gospel, not only within the jail population, but also amongst those who regularly walk among us. Because of the church’s oft-passive response, the irony is that there are those who may be greater spiritually bound within their legal freedoms than those who are legally incarcerated. Redeem the time my brothers and sisters, while you are yet able.

Please keep our ministry and our ministry volunteers in continued prayer as we endeavor to share the Word of God.

Working Within the Harvest - by Andrew Barney

I am still amazed as I have watched the ministry of the Mesa County Jail evolve into its own unique brand of growth within the working of the Holy Spirit. While unforeseen change within this ministry has certainly taken place, the constant has been the work of the Holy Spirit.

I recently had the experience of sharing what I have witnessed as a jail sergeant with the congregation at First Presbyterian Church this past October. Upon doing so, I was surprised to experience an overwhelming joy that emotionally overwhelmed me during my message.

I spoke of an inmate who accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior. Our exchanges within the jail as we exchanged words of encouragement as he shared the revelation knowledge that came within his daily bible devotionals. Over time I noticed that he regularly attended jail bible studies and established relationships of spiritual accountability with others in his pod.

Initially, I questioned his sincerity but lo and behold, there was something different within him after this experience. Upon his discharge, I realized that he hadn't returned to the jail. I wondered what had happened to him but hoped within me that his spiritual transformation had taken him to greater places in life.

Sure enough, one Sunday morning I saw this inmate at a distance across the church foyer interacting with other men associated with the church's men's group. We made a joint dash to acknowledge and embrace one another, not as jail deputy and inmate but rather as brothers united for Christ! The look on his face and his countenance radiated a joy I had never seen within him!

That is the power of God! I have such a newfound appreciation to all of those within the Mesa County Jail Ministry who give of their time as

they are obedient to the calling of Hebrews 13:3; "Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering." Although I had heard this verse before, its application and ensuing fruit strongly convicted me. God is faithful! It is we who can reap the blessings and promises of God as we are faithful to share the Good News!

As a sergeant within the Mesa County Sheriff's Office, I recognize that I have a different outlook upon inmates. They too are God's children with spiritual plans and laden-purpose specifically tailored to every one of them for

Mesa County Jail Ministry 2021 Breakfast Appreciation Banquet celebrates supporters!

The Mesa County Jail Ministry held its annual Breakfast Appreciation Banquet on September 18. The ministry convened to honor ministry supporters serving an open-breakfast free of charge to say “Thank You,” to all who have supported our ministry over the past several years.

“We are so humbled and appreciative to all of our supporters across our community,” said Board President Erik Borrell. “Truly, despite what our community has endured given Covid-19, our ministry has been able to sustain our ministry goals.”

“Having said this, the Covid-19 pandemic has affected nearly ministries across the world and our ministry was no exception,” says Borrell.

“I am not ashamed to share though that financial support from a year ago has dropped by more than fifty-percent compared to a year and a half ago. Still, we wouldn’t be where we are without our faithful supporters.”

Despite these unforeseen shortcomings, Borrell discussed the ministry’s vision. “If we were able to identify just three-hundred (300) faithful individuals from our entire community who would be willing to pledge just \$15 a month, we would substantially be able to maintain our ministry goals. For the costs of just a few cups of coffee, supporters can make a difference in supporting our ministry to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ within the jail population,” said Borrell. “Hebrews 13:3 calls us to remember those who are in prison. We need to remember that many of these inmates will be re-acclimated back into our society. Help us help them come out differently than the way they came into jail.”

Several churches and community supporters showed up to support the ministry including Richard Gallegos, a former Mesa County inmate who now serves on the ministry board.

“I myself can personally testify to the difference this ministry has made in my life,” says Gallegos. I’ve been incarcerated several times, but something changed during my last incarceration. The ministry shared the Gospel and the hope that only Jesus Christ can provide when one accepts Him as Lord and Savior.”

Gallegos shared his life-changing testimony with those in attendance and hopes to share his story with other inmates as he is able.

“Our ministry purchases various versions of the bible, we provide reading glasses to the indigent jail population, and we provide religious supplies for weekly church services. Financial support also goes towards our Chaplain’s salary and the work he provides within the community,” shared Borrell.

This easy...?

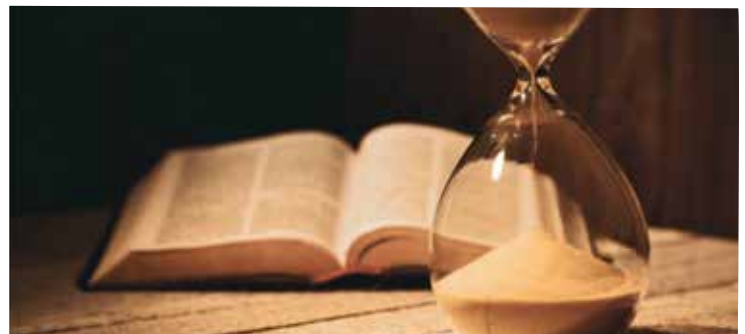

Life After Incarceration

Out with the old, in with the new...

Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think."

I've spent nearly thirty-two years establishing my world with specific people who understood me, who wouldn't judge me, and who didn't expect anything from me. We may not have been society's elite but we got by, fairly well I might add.



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Ironically, my lifestyle was part of the reason why I've served the time I have in jail. And honestly, it was just a part of the cycle I grew to expect. But something happened in there during my last incarceration. God. I knew of Jesus and the whole crucifixion story. As a matter of fact, I watched *The Passion of the Christ* when I was younger and I couldn't watch it all the way through. I mean, who would willingly suffer that way, especially if he was God!

I was familiar with the Mesa County Jail Ministry but never attended any of the bible

studies or church services. I guess I thought all the guys who did were hypocrites because if they were such good Christians, what were they doing in jail in the first place? It had to be fake and I couldn't figure out their motivation.

One day I saw Chaplain Michael in our pod meeting area and he was talking with another inmate. The inmate who was meeting with Chaplain was a man I never thought would have anything to do with religion. He was one of those tough-guy inmates. After a few minutes, I noticed that they bowed their heads together and prayed. After that, I saw for myself how that inmate was never the same. He was typically pretty temperamental, rarely came out of his cell and pretty much kept to himself. I noticed shortly after that he started attending pod bible studies. He also started hanging out with other inmates in attendance. I wondered what the heck happened to Mr. Tough Guy?

So I thought I would check it out for myself by attending a bible study. I heard a verse that changed the way I thought about everything. It reads, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." I remember thinking it couldn't be this easy. Then I remember tough guy inmate who was a different man, and dare I say, a new man.

I continued attending as many bible studies as I could. I got to know some of the other inmates. I even knew one guy from the streets. We knew each other but we had never spoken. He shared how God had changed his life and had realized all the people he had hurt including his wife and daughter.

Honestly, I felt pretty guilty. I thought about my estranged relationship with my parents. I'd stolen from them, lied to them and even threatened them. My father called me and told me to stay away from him and my mother because she was afraid of me. Can you believe that? My own mother was afraid of me! I remember just laughing thinking I didn't need them anyway. I had my friends, I had my hookups and basically I ran things the way I wanted. I was my own god and in my mind, I was pretty street savvy.

I attended bible studies for about four months and actually made a couple of good friends in jail. We would talk about everything! We mostly learned that we were in the same boat in the streets. But in here, we were different. We belonged! We were brothers in Christ! We trusted one another! In the streets I never trusted anyone! Even the people I hung out with on a regular basis.

Then it happened. I was being discharged. I realized that I really didn't have anyone. Not my family. Not anyone romantically, at least not anyone I loved, and certainly no brothers in Christ. But the cycle was set. I knew I had my old options, I knew where to go and who to call to get things rolling again in the streets.



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But something was different. I didn't want to. I didn't want to see those guys and yet I did because I wanted to share what I learned and I wanted to get to know them the way I did the inmates. I knew a couple of them had wives and children. I wanted to tell them that they needed to go home and be faithful to their wives and be good fathers. What happened to me! I didn't know how these two worlds could coexist but I had the sense enough to know I shouldn't try to make that happen. After a few months and time at community corrections, I had slowly gained my parents trust. I live with them and help them do



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things I didn't know they needed help with. All those years wasted. But by the same token, I had a new love for them and appreciate every day God gives me.

Returning to a lifestyle that guaranteed money and possessions and ungodly relationships was initially daily battle but I prayed for God to give me strength and as always, He was faithful.

That verse about the old and the new man is true, if you trust God! I have a message for the world. That message is Jesus and how He gave a man like me a chance to live a new life as a new man.

So, number one, have you accepted Jesus Christ?

As Chaplain, I meet with many people, both in the Mesa County Jail as well as men and women from our local community. Having said this, I can tell you most assuredly that there are some incarcerated inmates who are more spiritually free than many members of our community who are legally free. Taking it a step further and at the risk of offending anyone, many of these people in spiritual bondage are weekly faithful church goers.

What's the difference?

Consider the parable from Luke 18, "But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' 14I tell you, this man went down to his house justified, rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles

himself will be exalted."

So, number one, have you accepted Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior? If not, today is the day to do so! Simply pray this prayer...

Lord, I confess and admit that I am a sinner. I accept Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior and ask you to come into my heart. I believe you are the son of God who died and rose again on the third day. You are the Savior of the world and now the Savior of my soul. Forgive me of my sins and lead me as Lord of my life. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

If you prayed this prayer, the bible says you are now saved! Find a strong church that exclusively teaches from the Word of God (the bible) and get to know others who can spiritually strengthen you and journey with you as a new believer of Christ.

Dear Chaplain,

My fiancé of nine years whom I will anonymously address as “Scott” has been incarcerated at the Mesa County Detentions Center for the past seven months and was discharged about a month ago. During his incarceration, we remained in contact. He has been in and out of jail over the course of our relationship and I have remained loyal and committed to him despite his struggles with addiction. My previous relationship was with a man who also struggled with addiction and I was faithful to him as well for nearly seven years.

Anyway, during Scott’s last incarceration, he stated that he started attending bible studies and was meeting with you. He says he has accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior. At first, I was happy that he connected with you and with other inmates who could be a positive influence upon him.

Maybe the problem is me but I don’t know how to handle the new Scott. While I respect his faith, I myself am not a religious person as my mother aggressively forced religion upon me as a child. Church was never a positive experience for me and as an adult and I have my own relationship with God. Scott goes to church without me and has recently started attending a weekly men’s bible study. He recently told me that he no longer feels comfortable living together and said we could either get married or we needed to continue “dating” but live separately.

Honestly, I never considered Scott and I as “dating” couple. I love him and see him as my common law husband and thought that one day we would take the plunge and get married. I used to believe I would marry Scott tomorrow but now I am not so sure. I don’t believe we see religion the same way and I certainly am not willing to start going to church with him. I am caught between loving him or becoming a wife he expects me to be.

Dear In Love With a Stranger,

It seems that Scott has experienced God in a very real and different way that has changed him into a man you’ve never known. While I respect your loyalty and commitment, the fact that you have had at least two relationships with men who have struggled with addiction tells me that you yourself have likely grown comfortable within the emotional, mental, financial and psychological instability that comes with it.

Ask yourself what kind of qualities you desire in a man. I oftentimes ask ladies to consider what kind of man is worth them giving themselves emotionally, maternally, domestically, intimately, mentally, and financially.

A real healthy marriage is much more than simply living paycheck to paycheck, raising children and cycling through life believing that time equates to a thriving and satisfying relationship. Pray about this. I would also strongly consider you re-examining your own relationship with God. You are not that child anymore who is being force-fed religion. You are your own person who will stand before God one day to give an account for your life. God tells us in His Word “For I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not harm you. Plans to give you hope and a future.” We are also called to “Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not upon your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your path”

Knowing these things, who knows what good can come if you and Scott both loved and trusted God together as man and wife in the eyes of God! Consider the other end of the spectrum as well. Scott moves on and you meet another man with similar addictive struggles until something yet again gives.

It sounds like Scott loves you and believes in you but I would certainly also strongly consider pre-marriage and individual counseling. By examining your own emotions and relationship experiences, you will then be able to greater be able to give the best version of yourself within relationships.
