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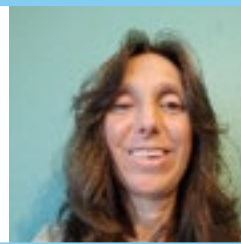
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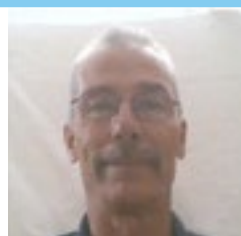
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# CHAPLAINS CORNER

The Illusion Of Freedom by Chaplain Michael A Hernandez

One of the questions I am oftentimes asked is if I am “afraid to be around all those hardened criminals.” I just laugh. But in all fairness to their question, my response is usually met with silence. I say to them, “some of the people in there are more humble and spiritually free than many of us out here sitting in church every Sunday morning!”

But what is freedom? From simple to complex, could it be something we have all been seeking at some point in our lives? Others may feel they have attained some version of it but typically their versions can be measured, by way of money or status or even within relationships. While these things may bring a certain type of satisfaction and even closure within ones senior years, is there anything to be said about the type of freedom that cannot be measured?

Inmates will oftentimes ask me to pray with them as they approach their sentencing date or date of release. While I am all too happy to journey with them in this manner, I invariably ask them what they are going to do with their freedom. Responses range from professional goals to relationship healing.

In the bible, Romans 6 tells us that “sin must no longer rule in your mortal bodies, so that you obey the desires of your natural self...sin must not be your master; for you do not live under law but under God’s grace.”

Sadly, sinful aspects are what many of us place our hope upon. They range from unhealthy lifestyles, illicit or sinful relationships, or the acquisition of money and worldly gain. For many inmates, release has only continued to spin the revolving door which is dictated by the same circumstances and illegal acts or behaviors. It is truly a shame because these inmates are also God’s children who possess an eternity with their heart and spiritual gifting’s for such a time as this.



Part of my responsibility as Chaplain is meeting with inmates when it pertains to death notifications. This entails notifying inmates of a personal loss such as a family member or loved one. It is especially painful for me because many times, inmates are left with the realization that the last memory their loved ones had of them was being incarcerated. Subsequently, there is no emotional closure within these life-long memories.

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And so within these exchanges, I try to simply “be” with inmates within the moment, oftentimes tearful with them myself. Invariably I ask them if there is anyone else they love outside of the jail. There typically always is.

I then ask inmates to consider how they could love them differently. That is, if given the opportunity again, might they consider how they could love these loved ones differently than they have? Going further, I ask them what could come if they placed their hand over their loved ones shoulder and simply spoke their heart in prayer.

The exchange within these moments sometimes spawns an agape-love realization in how inmates can love the people whom are left in their lives. We talk about parents, grandparents, children, and even long-ago relationships. Divine appointments like these



typically allow for a quiet and unforeseen trip down memory lane in which inmates realize that life is truly a gift not to be squandered or taken for granted.

But what of us who are not incarcerated? Has life and its responsibilities created a cycle of its own, trapping us within our own prisons without any locks? This spiritual epiphany that some of our inmates experience is priceless in that though there has been much loss and



uncertainty, imprisonment has also brought a freedom that exceeds any freedom we could want for ourselves.

These lifted spiritual veils typically spawns an epiphany regarding the illusion and deception of sin and bad-fruit despite its worldly gains. Inmates also recognize that life is but a vapor and how all of us will one day stand before The Almighty Father to give an account for what we did and whom we served.

Not all who are free are free. Not all who are incarcerated are imprisoned. The jail population is a population that is so easily forgotten. But I remind people within our community that most of them will be re-acclimated back into our community. The question is whom or what will be their master upon their release?

Please keep our ministry in prayer and prayerfully consider supporting our ministry as you invest in the ongoing work in sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ...while we are yet able.

## Dear Chaplain,

By God's grace, I am hoping to be released from the Mesa County Detention Center by mid-to-late fall of this year. One of the things I will never forget was when you allowed several inmates to watch The Passion of the Christ during Easter week. Although I had heard of how Jesus suffered for each and every one of us, seeing it played out changed my outlook on the love of Christ. I have to tell you that since then, I have never been the same. I have attended jail bible studies and spoken with you about issues I never discussed with anyone.

My concern however is what will happen to me upon discharge? I don't have any family here and my longtime fiancé has stopped communicating with me. Basically, I have no one here. What I do have is a renewed heart for God and even a strength to overcome a lifestyle I have known since the age of eleven. My greatest fear is that I will fall back into old cycles and lifestyles. I know how to make it on the streets as a man without God in my heart. But apart from that lifestyle, I am a baby Christian. Help! ~ Nathan – the New Man

## Dear Nathan,

First of all, I am so glad to hear your heart and how God has touched your heart, in this case by way of Hollywood! But beyond this, let me remind you that God has a plan for you and He purposefully placed you here, in this time with a clean heart and spiritual gifting's as you trust Him and surrender your life to Him.

The bible states that "the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God" (1 Cor. 1:18). I am in prayer for you but more so excited for you because of the many ways God is going to use you as you are faithful!

The bible also tells us that as we earnestly seek God, we will find Him. I oftentimes tell people that following Jesus Christ and his Biblical tenets is the most counter-intuitive thing a person can undertake because it goes against every fiber of our flesh, our reasoning, and even our good-intentions. But we're called to "trust in the Lord with all of our hearts and not rely upon our own understanding (Prov. 3:5-6). Walk by faith and not by sight. Walking by sight will more times than not, take you where you don't want or need to be.

# Volunteer spotlight

Testify To Love - Bill Moore

The following is Part I of a 2-Part testimonial of the Power of God working in the lives of His children within the Mesa County Jail Ministry within our efforts to bring glory to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

**My name is Bill Moore and I am the Director for the Reformers Unanimous, (RU) Program for our local correctional programs here in the valley.**

Subsequently, over the course of this time, I have recognized my own need for a deeper personal relationship with my Lord and Savior. While I have witnessed how the Word of God changes a person's life, I realized how teaching His Word can also greatly impact the teacher!

Despite the fact that I alone can do no real good to my fellow man, with the leading of the Holy Spirit, I am grateful that God has allowed me to witness and testify to His glory, as I have submitted to his teachings and omnipotence.

Secondly, through our church program, my family and I have had the immense blessings of getting to know many MCDF inmates as well as residents of Community Corrections. To this very day my children have many "aunts and uncles" they call by name. We have experienced the blessing of having many of these men and women to our house for food, fun & fellowship. The lifelong relationships the Lord has established through these ministry efforts are cherished not only by myself but by my family as well.

Another area that has brought a blessing is the unspeakable joy that has been experienced working "on the inside" at MCDF and Community Corrections. The spiritual and social transition that is experienced is when inmates experience the life-changing power "on the outside" within our ministry and of course during praise and worship at God's house. Upon discharge, inmates have a safe place to learn, grow and serve our Savior at Landmark Baptist Church.

Friday nights are reserved to help our students start the weekend in a Godly, sober environment.

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The RU Program is a Bible based, Christ-centered recovery program designed to rescue, recover, and restore those in addictive behaviors with the power of the victorious life found only in Jesus Christ. This discipleship program is truly transformational in that its premise are biblically driven and supported by not only our program staff, but by a proven peer support system. As former inmates work through the program, they gain an understanding of God's Word that they can personally apply to their lives and gain freedom and victory through Jesus Christ.

Well over 50% of our Friday night volunteer leaders have been previous occupants of MCDF, Community Corrections, or both.

I have had the privilege of volunteering at the Mesa County Detention Facility, (MCDF) since October 2008. It has truly been a blessing to me personally, as well as to my family and my church, Landmark Baptist.

Over the course of the past thirteen years, the hand of God as well as His blessings have allowed me to serve within this population.

Our program is designed with the family support system in mind. We pick up and take students and their family's home. We also offer a staffed nursery, "Kidz Club" for kids between the ages of three to eleven. We have also incorporated a teen program ages, for kids twelve and up called "Full Throttle" led by our Youth Pastor and his wife. On Saturday morning we offer the students a chance to go out in the community to serve the Lord through our soul winning and bus ministry efforts. The students learn the Bible Truth of taking the focus off themselves and putting it on others, that the Lord may use them to bless others.

God's gift of salvation, through His Son Jesus Christ is the beginning of a new life for all those who choose to follow Him upon their release. Life-Changing Truths are taught by God's teachers weekly and the reading of His Word. As RU is introduced to the residents on the inside, they are given the opportunity to continue the program on the outside.

Please pray for our ministry as we continue to share the Gospel within our community.

# Life After Incarceration

## The Judgement Begins... A New Believer's Journey

**“And you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.”**

Day 1...Released!

The day finally came! My time had been served. Four-year's probation, possibly two with good behavior.

Freedom. Wasn't that whole goal? Here I am. I have to admit, I am different from the way I came in. I met Jesus. I met guys just like me but different from me if that makes sense. I knew some of them from the streets but this time they were different.



The jail ministry provided bible studies. I went just because it's what some of the guys were doing but the last thing I wanted was religion. The religious volunteers were accepting of me. I didn't expect that from them at all. I guess I judged them because I thought they would judge me. But it wasn't their kindness or willingness to talk with me. It was what they taught about Jesus. This was a Jesus I had never known. I mean, I'd heard about how he died on the cross and rose again. But I never really thought about him as MY Savior. I was given a bible and even some reading

glasses. And it began. My life began unfolding. The people I loved...and lost. The people I used...and hurt. The family I abused and the pain I caused. I couldn't make that right, at least with my father who passed away during my incarceration. I'll never get the chance to apologize or tell him thank you for being a good father. All I am left with are my childhood memories with him and piggy-back rides on daddy's shoulders.

I still have my mother but my older brothers and sister won't let me be around her. I've caused so much pain that I guess I don't blame them. I guess she's accepted me as the son she lost. The son who beat up her other sons and knocked her husband down in a fit of rage.

Still, Jesus loves me?

I accepted him as my Savior and I haven't been the same since. I love differently! I see things differently! I see people differently! The people I used to run with now see me at the local coffee shop with an open bible. Our eyes meet and I can tell they are trying to figure out if I am really the guy they remember. But the guy they remember wouldn't be reading the bible! Then they see my tattoos, a very unique message and design that specifically defines “who I was.”

I knew I had to find a church. I needed to hear the truth I'd come to know in jail and I knew I needed to maintain my walk with God. God's Word was the reason I became who I am now. The Chaplain let me keep the bible I had been using and so I vowed to myself to never lose it!

Over time, I got a job, I got my own place and was walking to and from work. I seemed to be on a good path. The temptations and the old crowd were still there for the taking.

But I prayed for strength to overcome. And God was faithful! But I was missing something. Fellowship! I had come to appreciate my brothers in Christ, albeit in jail. I had heard of a relatively large church in the community. That type of church sounded good to me. I just wanted to blend in and not answer any questions.

The following Sunday I walked to church. I was greeted at the door by a man and a woman. It was nice to feel welcomed! The place felt a bit overwhelming at first. There were families and children and couples and even security teams all around. I felt safe which was odd to me because the only time I felt safe was when I was carrying a weapon. But I got rid of all my weapons and relied upon the Holy Spirit to lead and protect me.

The auditorium was not at all what I thought church would be like. I was expecting uncomfortable wooden pews, candles and statues at every corner. I found a far-away corner and sat down in a comfortably padded chair. This wasn't so bad.

Then I saw him. A member of the church security team stood right behind me against a



wall. He was communicating with someone on his radio. Our eyes met. There was no smile, no welcoming feeling. I felt like I was in jail again but this time there were no bars.

The service time was about twenty minutes



away. I noticed a café and thought I'd buy a cup of coffee. I got up to do so and purposely decided to sit on the other side of the auditorium upon my return. Then I looked back and saw him. That same security guy standing in a corner. Once again our eyes met. Same look of distrust. Then I remembered how I looked. My arms were covered with my street story. They were stories I was proud of that I had only shared with a handful of people. I supposed I couldn't blame him or anyone for judging me. After all, I could be anyone with malicious intentions. But couldn't anyone else there have malicious intentions as well?

I guess I will always be judged. After all, the stories on my arms and neck don't necessarily scream of Jesus and His love and mercy. But they were a part of who I was.

So I did what I think anyone in my shoes would've done. I got up and left. Before I opened the door to leave the church I looked back. I saw the security guy looking right at me. I never returned.

My story may not be what every inmate experiences. And I hold no animosity toward that particular church. I know if my family were there, they would be kept safe. Truly I can appreciate that.

Soon after I ran into an old acquaintance of mine. We used to work together. I remember he was always nice to me. I shared my story with him and how jail had changed my life. He invited me to go to church with him and his family. It wasn't a big church and I was made to feel very welcome, likely because I was with a member of the church. I am glad to say that I have attended church every Sunday since then. I tell this acquaintance, who is now a really good friend of mine, how thankful I am that he loved me enough to invite me and accept me despite my past. But I can't help but wonder how other released inmates might be made to feel should they decide to go to church, despite their own tattooed stories.

Despite my conversion for Christ, I wonder if judgment will follow me even still. Probably. But I see all of this as my testimony and how God could love and even use a guy like me to glorify Him. I am redeemed! ~TW - Former Inmate
