### "I HAVEN'T FELT THAT NORMAL IN A LONG TIME!"

Driving by, on the corner there they sit. Sign in hand "Anything Helps. God Bless." How many times do we think, "Why don't they just get a job?"

You catch the news about someone arrested and think, why would anyone do that? We agonize about friends and loved ones who are on the wrong path. Frustrated, we turn away from them having reached our limit.

After more than 40 years of ministering to inmates, I have come to see many of the inmates as being severely wounded in need of healing. For instance:

One fellow was raised by parents who cooked meth. When he went to school, he thought it was odd that his friends had no idea what he was talking about. He had been using meth for as long as he could remember. Some have been so brutalized physically and emotionally by their parents and others they are simply broken and escape into drug use. Many are afflicted by depression, PTSD, schizophrenia, and bi-polar disorder. Some of them self-medicate with illegal drugs and alcohol. Those who have been rejected do not fit in and are simply looking for acceptance. With low self-esteem, they find acceptance and fellowship in the culture of substance abuse and gangs.

Many are simply unable to function on their own in society with the only solution being incarceration. For some, the cumulative effect of the cycle of addiction, crime, and incarceration spans 20 years or more. The physical, spiritual, and mental decline for many is palpable. Recently, an Inmate explained to me how the longer he has struggled with addiction and incarceration the harder it is for him to imagine any other way of life. It is not unusual to talk with those whose life is centered around drug use, including alcohol, to have been through rehabilitation/treatment four or more times. It is not difficult for the inmate to relate to the concept of living in darkness. Many will not come into the light for fear that their behaviors will be exposed. As we minister to these inmates, they are pointed to the light of life in Jesus. As they live a life following Jesus, they come to live in the light with Proverbs 3:5-6 becoming their new reality.

Over the years of their arrest and rearrest I befriended an inmate who struggled with meth addiction. His story was one of being brutalized as a child. Each time he would be released from jail, we would try to help him get on his feet and get him into a fellowship at church. Every time he would slip back into the world of addiction only to be rearrested. Well, the last time he was released from jail, we did not know it was his last time, he stuck around. After a few shaky weeks he got a job that took him out of town now and then. That was a big blessing. We would make sure he was in Church on Sundays and included in our lives. One day after visiting in our home with some neighbors, on the way home he looked at me and said "Man, I have not felt that normal in a long time." Today he is living in the light.

Chaplain Tom and those volunteering at the Mesa County Detention Facility have been called to bring the mercy and grace of God to everyone whose path we cross. We do this through Bible studies, Sunday Services, individual counseling, providing Bibles, the book ministry, distribution of reading glasses to the indigent, and many smiles and much encouragement. The prayers and gifts of those who support this ministry are God's provision to ensure that the least of these are encountered and loved.
