Of Old Friends and Names We Can't Pronounce:

When we do Bible book studies in the jail, I like to use Philippians for a lot of reasons. It is only 4 chapters, so it lends itself to a quick turnaround, as inmates come and go at around 6,600 a year. It explains Christ very profoundly, but succinctly, in Chapter 2. He is God - yet he died a very horrible death on the cross as the Suffering Servant. It has a myriad of good memory verses that many of us have rattling around in our heads: "... I am confident of this very thing .". "For to me to live is Christ . Jesus EVERY KNEE WILL BOW . ", ". . . one thing I do forgetting what lies behind . . ., "Rejoice in the Lord always . . ., "Be anxious for nothing . . .," ". . . if anything worthy of praise, dwell on these things." "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.", ". . . my God will supply all your needs . . . "

But there is another reason I love Philippians. It is a great "body book." We often think of other books, like Corinthians, when we think of books that encourage life in the body. But Philippians is a living example of how the body SHOULD function. Paul says, "Follow Christ's example." But he also offers examples of others who are actually living out that principle. Paul mentions himself, he also mentions Timothy, and he mentions Epaphroditus. Epaphroditus? We hear his name. We struggle pronouncing it. We ask each other, "Who is that?" We know little about him, but we

know this: Paul said to "... hold men like him in high regard." I describe him as Paul's "bagman" to the inmates. I guess I should use the word "courier" instead.

Where would Paul be without Epaphroditus? Starving? Out of parchment and quills? Without a voice? Alone? Where would WE be if Epaphroditus had gotten drunk and left some of Paul's writings in a speakeasy in Asia Minor or Greece? What if he had absconded with the money? How badly would that have hurt the cause of Christ?

We at Mesa County Jail Ministry have our own Epaphroditus. Carl Boydstun was here at the beginning - long before myself and several of our volunteers. He functions as a board member and as our Treasurer. Carl has quietly and humbly taken care of us. He watches our "Ps and Qs." Carl slays the bureaucracy dragon before it rears its ugly head. He knows his job, and does it well. He asks very little of the rest of us. We are going to miss him, as he is retiring due to health reasons. Lt Jonathan Chambers gave the ministry a great compliment at our banquet last year. He said, in effect, that he knew of no other ministry that has a lower overhead than Mesa County Jail Ministry. So much of that compliment is due to Carl Boydstun. Carl helps other nonprofits as well. I know that they hold him in high regard also.

Thank you, Carl, for using your gifts, talents, and energy for God's Kingdom!
